
## **EXERCISE 3**


#### Start to develop the plot of your story, by following the steps below:

### **BACKGROUND**

'Fantastically Great Women Who Changed the World' is the musical stage adaptation of Kate Pankhurst's best-selling picture book, evolving out of the minds of dramatist Chris Bush and No.1 hit songwriter Miranda Cooper (Girls Aloud, Kylie Minogue)!

Like Pankhurst, they took inspiration from the stories of incredible wonder women, bringing characters like **Jane Austen**, **Frida Kahlo** and **Mary Seacole** to life. The production tells the story of Jade who breaks away from her class on her school trip in the local museum.

Jade is at a cross-roads; she never steps out of line, she's bright and polite, but also bored and ignored! She struggles to make her mark on the world, until she learns to trust her own unique story and celebrate what makes her important.

## **EXERCISE 1**

Whilst lost in the museum, Jade meets **Jane Austen**, who wrote some of the world's most successful books. In 1811, Austen published Sense and Sensibility, the first of her six major novels.

Like all good stories, Austen's novels went through planning stages, draft versions and edits. Start to plan your unique story, by first deciding on your literary genre.
